2. Best Time to Visit

Tanzania offers year-round safari opportunities, but the best time depends on what you want to experience:

Season	Months	Highlights
Dry Season (Peak)	June - October	Best wildlife viewing, Migration crossings
Green Season	March - May	Lush landscapes, Fewer tourists, Lower prices
Short Dry	January - February	Calving season, Baby animals, Predator action
Short Rains	Nov - December	Southern Serengeti migration, Good value

Pro Tip: For the Great Migration river crossings, visit Northern Serengeti between July and October.

3. Tanzania's Top National Parks

Serengeti National Park

Tanzania's most famous park, home to the Great Migration. Over 1.5 million wildebeest traverse its endless plains.

Best For: Great Migration, Big cats, Open plains

Ngorongoro Crater

A UNESCO World Heritage Site and the world's largest intact volcanic caldera. Home to approximately 25,000 animals including black rhinos.

Best For: Big Five, Scenic views, Dense wildlife

Tarangire National Park

Famous for its massive elephant herds (up to 6,000!) and iconic baobab trees. Less crowded than Serengeti.

Best For: Elephants, Baobab trees, Bird watching

Lake Manyara National Park

Known for tree-climbing lions and stunning flamingo-lined alkaline lake. Perfect for a day trip.

Best For: Tree-climbing lions, Flamingos, Scenery

Ruaha National Park

Tanzania's largest park, offering a wild, remote safari experience with excellent predator sightings.

Best For: Off-the-beaten-path, Lions, Wild dogs

4. The Big Five & Wildlife Guide

The "Big Five" refers to five of Africa's most iconic animals: lion, elephant, buffalo, leopard, and rhinoceros. Tanzania is one of the best places in Africa to see all five.

African Lion

The "King of the Jungle" - Best seen in Serengeti and Ngorongoro. Look for prides resting under trees.

African Elephant

The world's largest land animal. Tarangire has the highest concentration in Northern Tanzania.

Black Rhinoceros

Critically endangered. Best chance to see them: Ngorongoro Crater.

Cape Buffalo

Often found in large herds. Considered one of the most dangerous animals in Africa.

African Leopard

Elusive and nocturnal. Look in trees during early morning and late afternoon.

Other Wildlife to Spot

Cheetah, Hippo, Giraffe, Zebra, Wildebeest, Hyena, Crocodile, and over 500 bird species!

5. Safari Packing Checklist

Clothing

- Neutral-colored clothing (khaki, olive, tan, brown)
- Long-sleeved shirts for sun & insect protection
- Light pants or convertible trousers
- Warm fleece or jacket (mornings can be cold!)
- Comfortable walking shoes
- Sandals for relaxing at camp
- Wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses
- Swimsuit (many lodges have pools)

Gear & Equipment

- Camera with zoom lens (200mm+ recommended)
- Extra memory cards and batteries
- Binoculars (essential!)
- Power bank and universal adapter
- Flashlight or headlamp
- Dry bag for dust protection

Health & Toiletries

- Sunscreen (SPF 50+) and lip balm
- Insect repellent (DEET-based)
- Prescription medications
- First aid kit basics
- Hand sanitizer and wet wipes
- Anti-malaria medication

Pro Tip: Pack in soft-sided bags - they fit better in safari vehicles and small aircraft!

6. Accommodation Options

Tanzania offers accommodation for every style and budget:

Luxury Lodges & Camps

World-class service with stunning views, gourmet dining, and exclusive experiences.

Price Range: \$500 - \$2,000+ per person/night

Premium Tented Camps

Authentic safari experience with comfort. Spacious tents with en-suite bathrooms.

Price Range: \$300 - \$600 per person/night

Mid-Range Lodges

Comfortable accommodation with good amenities. Perfect balance of value and experience.

Price Range: \$150 - \$300 per person/night

Budget Camping

Basic tented camps or camping. Great for budget-conscious travelers.

Price Range: \$80 - \$150 per person/night

7. Health & Safety Tips

Vaccinations & Medications

Consult your doctor 6-8 weeks before travel. Common recommendations:

- * Yellow Fever (required if coming from endemic areas)
- * Hepatitis A & B
- * Typhoid
- * Anti-malaria medication (essential)

Safari Safety Rules

- * Always stay inside the vehicle unless your guide permits
- * Never feed or approach wild animals
- * Keep voices low to avoid startling wildlife
- * Follow your guide's instructions at all times
- * Don't use flash photography near animals

Pro Tip: Tanzania is one of Africa's safest countries for tourists. Our guides are highly trained professionals.

8. Photography Tips

Golden Hours: Shoot during 6-9am and 4-6pm for best light.

Zoom Lens: A 200-400mm lens is ideal for wildlife.

Eye Contact: Focus on the animal's eyes for compelling shots.

Tell a Story: Capture behavior, not just animals standing around.

Patience: Wait for the right moment - action shots are worth it!

Landscape Context: Include the environment to show the habitat.

Dust Protection: Keep lens caps on when not shooting.

Multiple Cards: Bring plenty of memory - you'll take thousands of photos!

9. Cultural Etiquette

Tanzania is home to over 120 ethnic groups with rich traditions. Here's how to be a respectful visitor:

Greetings: Learn 'Jambo' (Hello) and 'Asante' (Thank you).

Photography: Always ask permission before photographing people.

Dress Code: Cover shoulders and knees when visiting villages.

Haggling: Expected in markets, but do so respectfully.

Tipping: \$10-15/day for guides, \$5-10/day for camp staff.

Left Hand: Use your right hand when giving/receiving items.

Pro Tip: Learning a few Swahili phrases will delight locals and enhance your experience!

10. Frequently Asked Questions

Q: How many days do I need?

A: We recommend 5-7 days minimum. 10+ days allows multiple parks and Zanzibar.

Q: What currency is used?

A: Tanzanian Shilling (TZS), but USD is widely accepted. Bring clean, recent bills.

Q: Is it safe to drink the water?

A: Stick to bottled water, provided at all camps and lodges.

Q: Will I have cell service?

A: Coverage is spotty in parks. Consider it a digital detox!

Q: Are safaris good for children?

A: Yes! Many lodges cater to families. We recommend ages 5+.

Q: Do I need a visa?

A: Most nationalities need a visa. Apply online or get it on arrival (\$50 USD).
